Governor-General of St. Vincent and the Grenadines



His Excellency Sir Frederick Nathaniel Ballantyne, G.C.M.G., MD

Guest Speaker

His Excellency Sir Frederick Nathaniel Ballantyne is the Governor-General of St. Vincent and the Grenadines. Born in St. Vincent and the Grenadines on July 5, 1936, he attended the St. Vincent Boys Grammar School, after which he pursued post secondary and graduate studies at various Universities in the USA where he acquired several degrees. He later returned to SVG as a Medical Doctor.

Between 1985 and 1995, he served in many capacities in the medical field. Among his many posts, he served as Consultant in Internal Medicine, Coordinator of Visiting Specialist Programs, Chief Medical Officer and Assistant Dean of Clinical Studies at St. George's University Medical School, Chief of Medicine and Medical Director at the Milton Cato Memorial Hospital. Other Government appointments that he undertook included Chairman of the St. Vincent Medical Board, Overseeing licensing of Physicians in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and Member of the St. Vincent Government Mercy Committee.

As an entrepreneur he became the Chairman and Co-owner of Young Island Resorts, and Chairman of Ballantyne Enterprises Limited. He was also involved in Marina Operations as ell as Yacht Chartering and Portfolio Investments. He was President of Dimethaid International Inc. and a Former President of the St. Vincent Co-operative Bank.

Sir Frederick has been in the Office of the Governor-General of St. Vincent and the Grenadines since September 2, 2002, and was knighted in November of that year.

As the Governor-General, though the Queen's representative, in the exercise of his executive powers he is required to act on the advice of the Prime Minister. He, however, holds office at Her Majesty's pleasure. While the Governor-General is seen as part of Parliament, his presence is only there when he is invited, though he is always informed of what takes place. Nevertheless, in order that any law may be regarded as such it must receive the assent of the Governor-General. He must also sign the Writs for the proroguing, dissolution or commencement of a new session of Parliament. The Governor-General also appoints all officials of the House of Assembly.

2009 MESSAGE TO VINCENTIANS IN CANADA BY DR. THE HON. RALPH E. GONSALVES PRIME MINISTER OF ST. VINCENT AND THE GRENADINES

Thirty years ago our Nation achieved its formal, constitutional independence. It was a most challenging year: The volcano at La Soufriere erupted in April 1979 and on Independence Day, October 27th, thousands of our fellow citizens were still living in "camps", displaced from their homes. Still, the joy of independence, the sense of a national rebirth, and our optimism of a better future, grounded in our Faith, in God, sustained us. Our Constitution proclaimed in the opening lines of its Preamble the majestic, beautiful words: "We, as Vincentians, affirm that our Nation is founded on the belief in the supremacy of God and the freedom and dignity of man". It was so beautiful! Our National Anthem captured our mood and strength; Kenneth "Vibrating Scakes" Alleyne celebrated the event in a calypso of enduring quality; and our Founding Father, Robert Milton Cato, hoisted our National Flag. Our Nation was born!

Thirty years later, our Nation is much better off materially but awesome challenges have come upon us from outside in the form of a veritable international economic tsunami. Still, we are coping and advancing admirably in our quest to build a modern, competitive post-colonial economy. This economic construction has to be accompanied by a more uplifting spirit not lodged merely in economic prosperity. The Education Revolution, our reaching for an authentic cultural reclamation which at the same time embraces enduring core universal values, the Constitutional Reform Project, and Vincy Homecoming are all part and parcel of this drive to ennoble further our Caribbean civilisation and its magnificent Vincentian component.

This year as we celebrate thirty years of independence, we proclaim "A Journey to be proud of -a future to look forward to". In so doing, we draw inspiration from our history, the heroic work of our forbears, and the heavenly promise of our young people in this our sacred landscape and seascape called St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

In this Homecoming" venture, as in every other aspect of public policy, our diaspora, including our wonderful nationals residing in Canada, is always with us at home. Our Nation is whole and ought never to be fractured.

I love you most sincerely. All the best for Independence 2009!

I have a dedicated love for sports and community volunteering. While in high school I was on the Junior and Senior Boys basketball team and had the opportunity to be the captain of the team all 4 years I was there. In addition to being captain I was voted MVP player of the team 3 years in a row, 1 year on the junior team and 2 years on the senior team. I was also part of the football team. My first year on the team, I was voted most improved player. The next three years I was nominated MVP on the team and also was the winner of the Best Defensive Back of the year. The last year of my football career I was given the opportunity to be the first ever winner of the Hamilton Tiger- Cats Athletic Scholarship, a recognition for my success in athletics and dedication in the community. I was also part of the track and field team where I participated in hurdles and long jump and I recently hold the 110m seniors boys hurdle record for my high school.

In addition to sports I have helped out in the community. For three years I have coached under-11-year- old boys basketball and 2 out of those three years I was able to take them to the championships.
