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
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### Honouring an SVG Music Icon Frankie McIntosh

Frankie McIntosh is being honoured with a Sunshine Award. The view from many in the Caribbean music industry is that an award for this well-loved and universally respected musician is long overdue. Frankie McIntosh was honoured by his country, St Vincent and the Grenadines with a postal stamp.

Among this year's honorees for Sunshine Awards Hall of Fame, which will be held on October 3 in Manhattan, is the legendary soca music arranger and keyboardist Frankie McIntosh.

Since the mid-1970s, McIntosh has arranged over 2,500 songs and led recording sessions with almost every important calypsonian and soca artist in the Caribbean. He is a member of the elite pantheon of arrangers, including Ed Watson, Leston Paul, Clive Bradley, and Pelham Goddard, who helped forge the revolutionary soca style in the late 1970s and early 1980s.

For many McIntosh's award is long overdue. St Vincent and the Grenadines leader Dr Ralph Gonsalves noted, "He is a Caribbean music icon who has rendered exceptional service as a musician, arranger, and producer. He has unselfishly contributed his talents to mold and help develop younger Caribbean artists." His country has already given McIntosh the rare honour of putting him on a stamp.

Dr Hollis Liverpool, the calypsonian Chalkdust, who worked with McIntosh on numerous recordings reflected: "Frankie is one of those Caribbean geniuses whom we often take for granted. As a Calypsonian on the stage, if I happen to glimpse him as a musician in the band, I know my calypso performance will reach close to perfection."

Frankie McIntosh was born in Kingstown, St Vincent in 1946. His father, Arthur McIntosh, led a popular dance orchestra, the Melotones. The band played primarily instrumental dance orchestrations of calypso, Latin, and American standards, but members gathered at the McIntosh home on Sunday afternoons for jazz jam sessions.

Frankie took piano lessons as a youngster starting at age nine, then joined his father's band at age ten and formed his own band by age 14. After graduating high school and teaching in Antigua for three years,

Frankie McIntosh migrated to New York and began studying music at Brooklyn College in 1968.

While earning a bachelor's degree in music at Brooklyn College and an MA in music at New York University, he played keyboards with several Caribbean and American R&B groups, and he jammed with leading New York jazz musicians. He trained under many leading musicians including John Lewis of the Modern Jazz Quartet and Chopin expert Zenon Fishbein.

McIntosh's first foray into calypso came in the summer of 1976 when Becket, a St Vincent calypsonian who had recently relocated to New York, approached him about tightening up several of his calypso arrangements for an upcoming Manhattan boat-ride engagement.

The two hit it off, and shortly after McIntosh arranged his first calypso recordings for Becket's 1977 Disco Calypso album, which included Becket's most popular song, Coming High. Today the piece is considered classic early soca, and is widely admired for McIntosh's ingenious use of advanced harmonies, sophisticated jazz solos, and rhythmic break/groove sections.

Granville Straker, Brooklyn's premiere record producer at the time, was highly impressed with the Becket recordings, and in 1978 approached McIntosh about arranging for his label. The two Vincentians would go on to forge a musical alliance that would last for decades.

McIntosh became musical director for Straker's Records, organising the house recording band and arranging for dozens of Straker's calypsonians including Chalkdust, Shadow, Calypso Rose, Winston Soso, Poser, Lord Nelson, Singing Francine, Duke, King Wellington, and others. He would eventually go on to arrange for Brooklyn's other major calypso/ soca labels, Charlie's Records and B's Records.

As the music moved into the 1980s McIntosh emerged at the forefront of the new soca style, with arrangements famous for their innovative horn lines, catchy synthesiser figures, and sophisticated harmonic settings.

Though McIntosh maintained his permanent residence in Brooklyn, his influence was felt throughout the Caribbean. Classic calypsos that won the Trinidad Calypso Monarch for Chalk Dust in 1981 (Things That Worry Me) and 1989 (Chauffer Wanted), and the Road March for Sparrow in 1984 (Doh Back Back) and for Duke in 1987 (Thunder) featured McIntosh arrangements.

McIntosh is held in the highest esteem by musicians and singers alike. Calypso King of the World Mighty Sparrow commented: "Frankie's unique style and approach for the task at hand puts him ahead of his time. His depth is unfathomable and he is a gifted musician."

Soca giant Explainer recalled, "The greatest arrangement I ever had on any song was Frankie McIntosh's work on 'Lorraine.' I met him in Brooklyn around 1980 and gave him the basic melody and the lyrics. What he gave me back was the whole song—he did the bass line, the horns, the chords, everything. Back then I wasn't even sure if we should even record it, but Frankie said 'trust me.' And it turned out to be my biggest song ever."

McIntosh brought a genuinely flexible, jazz-influenced sensibility to the recording studio. Chalkdust and other artists recall McIntosh being much freer than older arrangers, allowing musicians and singers more input, modifying arrangements on the spot during sessions, and in general leaving room for modest embellishments and improvisation.

As McIntosh put it: "Oh yes, even when I go to a full score, it's never like this is written in stone and we must stick to this. From the first date, if we are playing the rhythm section and I don't think a chord works I will change them. Or I would change the horn line or the bass line in a flash...I was always open to ideas, as long as they worked.

These days McIntosh continues to arrange and perform in New York, occasionally touring back to the Caribbean. He has been the head of the music department at PS 270, The DeKalb School in Brooklyn.

### **Community Development: Pearl McIntosh-Woods**

Pearl McIntosh-Woods was born in Brighton, St. Vincent, adopted by her grandmother, and grew up in Bequia where she gained her education and eventually became a teacher and taught for a few years prior to immigrating to Canada. After a short period of time, Pearl received employment with the Ontario Government to assist persons in accessing certain benefits. Later on, Pearl transferred to other areas in the Ontario Public Service and attended night classes to further her knowledge of the Canadian Pension System.

As the number of SVG nationals migrating to Toronto increased, Pearl said, "We tried to keep in touch with one another, hence the formation of the Bequia Social Organization. Pearl is a founding member of that organization and served as president for over twelve years. Pearl shared her teaching skills in other areas. She was invited to assist in teaching in Math and English at a church program in Scarborough and subsequently coordinated a tutorial class program on Saturdays. She eventually joined the scholarship team and have been sponsoring and assisting students -- who attended the church -- to further their education. Peal has also been very active in sponsoring children back home with the help of staff at the Bequia Sunshine School.

After almost thirty-two years in the public service, Pearl retired as manager of pension and benefits, and still wanting to help others, she opened a business (WOODS & ASSOCIATES) in February 1997. Pearl continues to assist others in making the transition from work to retirement through workshops on Pre-Retirement and Finances and Wills and Estates. These seminars are run by professionals in the respective fields. Pearl's clients are happy to have such needed commodity and many commented that they would have been lost without her guidance. Pearl continues to share her talents with the community and consults with the Toronto SVG consulate office for assistance in obtaining information on persons who have returned home to live while receiving Canadian pensions. She wants to ensure that all who contributed to the pension system whether in Canada or in SVG receive their due benefits.

Pearl is a proud and loving mother of two children and a granddaughter, and her many friends and clients usually comment on her involvement in encouraging them to live a positive life of giving, for the greatest gift that one can give is oneself.

### Business: Monica"Nola"Smith

Monica Smith, better known in the SVG community as Nola Smith is the owner -operator of Hairoun Bakery. Established in 1987, Hairoun Bakery, is a family run business, that has been serving the SVG and other Caribbean communities for decades. It provides a myriad of breads and assorted pastries that cater to all taste buds.

Hairoun Bakery has been a long-standing contributor to events held by St. Vincent and Grenadines Association of Toronto (SVGAT). At any event, such as Mother's Day, the Annual Independence Church Service, the Children's Christmas Party and any other event the Association is hosting, Hairoun Bakery can be depended on to provide baked goods. And, when cakes or pastries are not the order of the day, Mrs Smith finds other ways to give back, whether through gift cards for events or simply taking out an ad in the Association's newsletter, Insight. Vince's formal musical career began at the age of 9 when he learned to play the violin. At age 14 he became interested in the steel pan, and by age 16 he entered his first steel band competition as a novice member of the Melody Makers band.


Vince was later commissioned to head the Royal St. Vincent Police Force steel band as arranger and pan tuner a few years before to migrating to Canada, by which time he had already won a total of 16 competitions (six panoramas, four solos, one king of steel, and five talent shows). Vince has also performed in the UK and the USA.

In Canada Vince has received many awards for his excellence as a steel pan instructor at various Canadian institutions. Most significantly he was honored by the Ontario Steel Pan Association with a "Pan Pioneer" award for his contributions to the steel band movement.

Vince has recorded several CD's and one vinyl record that made the Caribbean's top ten.

### Julian McIntosh & the Thunderbolts

Vincentian bom sax virtuoso, Julian McIntosh, has been entertaining the Canadian Caribbean Community for many years and has been known to stir up plenty of emotions with his music around the world, thrilling audiences from the Caribbean to North America.

His saxophone and his singing covers a spectrum of beats and moods. It includes calypso, reggae and some fusion, aimed directly at the hearts of music lovers. For those who are into Caribbean music, his name is an instant drawing card, coming from a household of respected musicians: Everyone from his grandfather to his father and brother are master music men.

His cousin, Frankie McIntosh, is a highly touted calypso composer and arranger who is also well respected in the USA for his orchestration skills in jazz and classics. Julian, who joined his first band when he 12, along with Frankie, attended the Brooklyn Academy. Julian subsequently moved to Montreal in the 1970s. He has come full circle, and is just as high on Caribbean music as ever and remains on the circuit with his band the "Thunderbolts".


