SVGAT 37th Independence Message from Consul General Huggins



On behalf of the Government of St Vincent and the Grenadines, Staff of the Consulate General of St Vincent and the Grenadines and my family, I extend warmest greetings and congratulations to all Vincentians on the celebration of our 37th Independence anniversary.

As we celebrate this year's Independence, let us pray for our brothers and sisters in Haiti who are suffering since the island was hit by Hurricane Matthew. Hurricane Matthew made land fall on many of our CARICOM neighbours leaving death and massive flooding in its path and further impacted our economies.

For this year, we should pay attention to the impact of Climate Change on our economies especially at a time when we are in the middle of the hurricane season. Over the last five years we have seen many disasters that have impacted our island causing damages amounting to one third of our Gross Domestic Product (GDP). Homes were destroyed, infrastructure was damaged and most importantly lives were taken. Because there are so many impacts of climate change, scientists have broadly categorized them into three areas:

- Erratic climate and weather extremes
- Altered ecosystems and habitats
- Risks to human health and society

Our beautiful beaches in the Grenadines and tourism facilities in low-lying areas like Calliaqua, Colonarie, Port Elizabeth, Layou, Ashton and Chateaubelair are under serious threats from high sea level rises. It means, therefore, that if some measures aren't adapted now then these impacts will continue to erode the gains that we have made in tourism over the past thirty-seven (37) years of Independence.

Our government has an environmental and economic responsibility and has embarked on the Geothermal project as part of our sustainable development goal to reduce our carbon footprint. St Vincent and the Grenadines is contributing to the reduction of the emission of heat-trapping gases from human activity especially the burning of fossil fuels for energy that is causing our atmosphere to heat up. The Geothermal project is expected to supply most of our electricity demand when the project is completed in 2018.

On reflection over those 37 years since Independence, our country's national status has improved exponentially. Vincentians at home and abroad are extremely proud to fly our national flag and wear our national colours. National Pride can only be enhanced by the way we treat our national symbols and the positive messages that we communicate about our beloved country. Our foreign policy has extended beyond our traditional friends, United States, Britain and Canada. We are friends of all and enemies of none. St Vincent and the Grenadines has become one of the most recognisable and respected nation in the hemisphere and we should be proud of that fact.

Published in the Toronto Star: Pediatrician made us crv for the right reasons: Porter

Dr. Robert Sutton, who retired this week, is a hero to parents, but himself has someone to thank for saving his vision

Dr. Robert Sutton weeps in his office, but it's not for the same reason as all his patients, and the children of his patients who are now patients themselves, who have held a "cry fest" all week.

Goodbyes are hard, particularly to the man who met you at desperation's door and calmly ushered your sick child back to health.

Sutton is a pediatrician. He retired this week, more than 45 years after he joined a practice at Coxwell and Danforth Aves. He is also a pioneer, the first black doctor hired by the Hospital for Sick Children.

Sutton is weeping because another doctor saved his eyesight six years ago. He'd had routine cataract surgery, but an infection set in. He returned to the clinic at Toronto Western Hospital. but was sent home by the doctor. "Betty and I arrived home," he says. (Betty is his wife and office manager of the past 44 years.) "As soon as we walked in the door, the phone rang." On the phone was the ophthalmology resident who had seen him in the clinic, calling to say he'd found someone to treat his eye that night.

"He got his friend — a fellow— to get out of bed (to do the procedure) and the pharmacist out of bed to prepare the meds... Everyone agrees if I'd waited till the next morning, I would have lost the eye," says Sutton, 77, removing his glasses and dropping his face into his hands. "I feel so grateful."

The irony of course, is that so many of his patients are in tears this week because of the kindness Sutton showed them when they, too, were nakedly vulnerable.

Community Development: Eldine Barnwell



Mrs Eldine Barnwell has been the president of the Union Island Cultural Association (UICA) for 19 years. To accomplish this feat, one must be a leader who understands group dynamics and possess the requisite people skills. One must also be a visionary in order to keep a membership going strong as the UICA does. Eldine, as she is fondly known in the SVG community, is such a leader.

In 1997, Eldine, along with her late husband Dennis, got together with friends Beverley Adams and William Regis to discuss what they can do for the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Community both here in Toronto and in Union Island. Out of this discussion, the UICA was born. The first event was held utilizing Eldine's personal funds. While expecting just a few persons to attend, a little over 120 showed up. Today, the UICA attracts over 400 (sometimes up to 500) at its annual brunch.

The UICA holds three main events annually; a brunch, a family picnic and a games evening. Funds raised from these events support many worthy causes in Union Island annually - Scholarships of \$500.00 CDN each are distributed to six children at the High School level, \$1000.00 CDN is sent to the Lions Club each

year to assist seniors and both Ashton and Clifton elementary schools receive school supplies for students. Eldine has also been known to direct her group to send bed linens to the schools to outfit their "sick room". In the past, the organization has also sent wheelchairs and other medical supplies to the Clinic and the group is currently working on the restoration of the cemetery that is badly in need of repairs.

Eldine, left Union Island at a very young age and went to England. She arrived at the Eastham Hospital in London, England, where she began a nursing career in midwifery. Later on, after coming to Toronto, she began working as a Registered Nurse at Sunnybrook Hospital where she stayed until her retirement. At her retirement party, many of her colleagues were impressed by the number of doctors who attended the event. They commented on the fact that never before had they seen so many doctors attend an occasion for a nurse. Still, today, many of her friends from Sunnybrook attend the Union island brunch each year. According to Eldine, "...when I call, they come".

Eldine credits all members of the UICA for the organization's accomplishments. "We work as a team", she says. She also credits her late husband, Dennis, who passed away in 2014, for working right alongside her. Dennis handled all of the administrative tasks as the organization's secretary. With a smile on her face as she reminisced about Dennis, she says "...you know, he was very good with the computer and I was not so he did all that type of work ...and I am still, not good at it today." Perhaps if we listen closely, we may hear the members of her group say "I'm With Her"!

- Donated a video projector, popcorn machine and groceries to VINSAVE which provides nutritional and health needs for children - VINSAVE also administers training in Early Childhood Education
- Handed over groceries at Christmas to the Liberty Lodge Boys' Training Centre
- · Forwarded to TROPICANA, a monetary contribution in support of their youth development programmes
- Presented a financial contribution to the SVG GEMS Organisation which subsidizes several charities in SVG

The next major event of the Toronto SVG Support Group is our Christmas Cool-Down which includes dancing and a variety of entertainment, on the evening of Monday, December 26th (the following day being a public holiday) at the TROPICANA Centre on Huntingwood Road between Brimley and McCowan, in Scarborough. Published in the Toronto Star: Pediatrician made us cry for the right reasons: Porter

Dr. Robert Sutton, who retired this week, is a hero to parents, but himself has someone to thank for saving his vision

Dr. Robert Sutton weeps in his office, but it's not for the same reason as all his patients, and the children of his patients who are now patients themselves, who have held a "cry fest" all week.

Goodbyes are hard, particularly to the man who met you at desperation's door and calmly ushered your sick child back to health.

Sutton is a pediatrician. He retired this week, more than 45 years after he joined a practice at Coxwell and Danforth Aves. He is also a pioneer, the first black doctor hired by the Hospital for Sick Children.

Sutton is weeping because another doctor saved his eyesight six years ago. He'd had routine cataract surgery, but an infection set in. He returned to the clinic at Toronto Western Hospital, but was sent home by the doctor. "Betty and I arrived home," he says. (Betty is his wife and office manager of the past 44 years.) "As soon as we walked in the door, the phone rang." On the phone was the ophthalmology resident who had seen him in the clinic, calling to say he'd found someone to treat his eye that night.

"He got his friend — a fellow— to get out of bed (to do the procedure) and the pharmacist out of bed to prepare the meds... Everyone agrees if I'd waited till the next morning, I would have lost the eye," says Sutton, 77, removing his glasses and dropping his face into his hands. "I feel so grateful."

The irony, of course, is that so many of his patients are in tears this week because of the kindness Sutton showed them when they, too, were nakedly vulnerable.
