

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BREAKING NEWS

PM gives airport update *Carmelita Jamieson, 2006/04/07*

Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves on Tuesday said the International Airport Development Corporation (IADC) has agreed to purchase and develop 21 acres of land at Harmony Hall to be sold to Argyle homeowners displaced by the construction of the airport there. Homeowners will be asked to pay \$7 per square foot rather than the market price of \$12.

Her Majesty's Prisons has resumed clearing of the land in preparation for the infrastructural development expected to commence by the end of May. Once the lands are cleared sufficiently, he said, tours for homeowners will be organized by mid to late April when lot selection will commence. The Prime Minister said a number of initiatives are also under consideration for the homeowners. Government is considering waiving the 5% stamp duty and will bear all the legal fees in the conveyance of the property.

Dr Gonsalves said homeowners at Argyle can remove all and any fixtures from their property even as he said government would decide if it can afford a relocation allowance. Some persons, Dr Gonsalves said, have been paid for their properties while others have received a substantial portion of their compensation.

Meanwhile, the government is also involved in tense negotiations with farmers at Pembroke Estate near to the Buccament on the Bay Restaurant where investors are interested in building a multi-million tourism resort.

Should these two projects be allowed to go ahead they would be deemed two of the biggest projects in the history of SVG to be going on at the same time.

CONTRIBUTED ARTICLES

Financial Planning By Lance Garraway CFP

Many local sayings have become acceptable reminders of the way we live our lives. Sayings such as "If you don't know where you're going, how will you know when you get there"; and "If you stand for nothing, you will fall for everything".

These two are certainly applicable to the way we conduct our financial lives and to its eventual success or failure. Many people talk about wanting to retire comfortably or wanting to send their children to university but have not taken the next step towards realizing those dreams; among others. As the saying goes, "if you don't know where you're going how do you know when you get there"? This is where financial planning becomes important.

The term financial planning brings to mind many misconceptions, it is for the rich, it cost too much money; among them. Simply put, it is a process which when followed provides a greater possibility of success in achieving your goals. The first step in the process is taking an accurate assessment and review of your income, your expenditures, assets and debts. This forms the platform from which everything else is built. Secondly a listing of all your financial goals is important in order to identify the time frame and priorities of each. Thirdly, reviews of what steps are being taken now to achieve these goals must be done and an action plan put in place to implement steps towards those goals. Fourthly, appropriate reviews are necessary to ensure that the plan is still appropriate and applicable to your goals and changing financial circumstances.

The above review of the planning process is not an exhaustive discussion of the subject but covers the main guidelines. The need to have a written plan in place is where the other saying comes into place, "If you stand for nothing, you'll fall for everything". Quite simply many people try to run their financial lives by trying every new piece of information heard on the TV, every hot tip whispered by a friend or read in the newspapers;

whether it applies to their circumstances or not. They fall for everything, guaranteeing financial failure. They are susceptible to each new hot trend or past glory. They try going forward by constantly looking in the rear view mirror.

Financial advisors are trained to work in implementing the planning process above and in providing a written blueprint to achieve the intended goals. One of the most important services of the advisors though is to keep the focus on the plan so that you do not "fall for everything". The aforementioned is one of the most undervalued services of an advisor, preventing costly decisions being made at the wrong time.

It is never too late to start the process. Be mindful of the two sayings and take action today.

Breadfruit: From East to West – A Brief Account by Fred Prescod

It is believed that the breadfruit is native to the Malayan Archipelago. From there it was carried to other Pacific islands in prehistoric times. There are later accounts of Spanish voyagers having come across the plant in the Solomon Islands during the 16th Century and in Tahiti in the early 17th Century.

At the beginning of the 18th Century English explorers promoted the idea of introducing the tree to the West Indies. Also, periods of famine during the late 1800's prompted Jamaican plantation owners to petition King George III to import breadfruit trees to provide food for their slaves.

Now accounts of Captain William Bligh's notorious 10-month voyage between 1787 and 1788 are well documented. His crew mutinied and set him adrift near Tahiti. In a second attempt Bligh sailed in 1791 with 2000 breadfruit plants bound for the West Indies. This voyage was successful. It resulted in the introduction of the breadfruit in 1793 to the islands of St. Vincent and Jamaica, from where plants were subsequently distributed to other islands of the West Indies.

Some authorities indicate that there is evidence of a French Navigator having brought a seeded variety of breadfruit to the French West Indies from the Philippines in 1772. It is also believed that some seedless and seeded breadfruit plants reached Jamaica from a French ship bound for Martinique but captured by the British in 1782. In addition there appears to be a record of a plant having been sent from Martinique to the St. Vincent Botanical Garden before 1793. It has also been suggested that the seeded breadfruit was carried by Spaniards from the Philippines to Mexico and Central America long before any reached the West Indies.

Today breadfruit trees are commonplace in the backyards and gardens of many rural and urban homes in the West Indies, and trees can be seen growing as far north as Key West, Florida. Raw or canned fruit can also be found in North American and European groceries and markets.

Of historical and horticultural significance is the presence today of a tree said to be a descendant of the original tree planted by Captain Bligh in the Botanical Garden in St. Vincent. And of course most Vincentians are aware of the fact that this Botanical Garden is the oldest in the Western Hemisphere. It was established in 1765.

#### **Vincentians Encouraged to Save Energy**

VINLEC has been mandated by the government to carry out a publicity and information campaign on the experimentation of using energy efficient bulbs therefore replacing the incandescent light bulbs they have used for years. It is expected that the approximately 250,000 energy efficient bulbs will be required and a team of Cuban experts will oversee the project with the assistance of some young Vincentians. The estimated cost of electricity in SVG is EC\$10.26 million, equivalent to 5,000 tonnes of fuel.

#### **Heritage Month Celebrations**

As a part of Heritage Month Awareness, East Indians commemorated their arrival in SVG. It was on June 1, 1861 that some 260 Indians landed at Edinboro, just outside of Kingstown. This trip from Madras, India was the first of eight trips to bring a total number of 2,475 Indians during 1861 to 1890 from several parts of India. They came to St. Vincent for economic reasons – the shortage of labour on the plantations following the abolition of slavery on August 1, 1838. India was at that time feeling the impact of years of famine. The Indian population, though shrinking has contributed immensely to the growth and development of St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

courses and seminars to educate them about how the new tax will affect their livelihood.

#### **PM's Press Secretary Murdered**

Popular journalist and political activist Glen Jackson was found dead in the back of his car on March 6. The murder sent a chill throughout St. Vincent and the Grenadines and the government has made it clear that it will leave no stones unturned in trying to solve the vicious crime. Mr. Jackson became a close friend of Prime Minister Ralph Gonsalves following the role Mr. Jackson played in using his radio program to bring down the former NDP government and paving the way for the ULP to take over governance of the country.

An official funeral was held for him on March 15 which drew a wide cross section of Vincentians to overcrowd the Kingstown Methodist Church and later the streets on the way to the cemetery. The government has announced a reward of EC\$100,000 to anyone who could provide information that would lead to the arrest and conviction of the murderer. Scotland Yard detectives are assisting the local police with the investigations. Meanwhile, Dr. Gonsalves has announced the naming of a scholarship in Jackson's honour.

#### **Constitution Review Committee Report**

The final report of the Constitution Review Committee of St. Vincent and the Grenadines was presented to the House of Assembly on February 28, 2006. The Commission held numerous discussions with Vincentians throughout St. Vincent and the Grenadines as well as with Vincentians in the Diaspora.

#### **Changes in UK Immigration Rules**

From 3 April 2006, there will be important changes in Immigration Rules, which will affect people applying for leave to remain, and indefinite leave to remain (or settlement), in the UK.

#### The changes in summary are: -

For all employment-related categories of entry to the UK, and those who have entered under the Ancestry category, the qualifying period for indefinite leave to remain (settlement) is now 5 years.

The initial grant of leave to remain will now be 2 years (except for Work Permit holders and Retired Persons of Independent Means), followed by a subsequent period of up to 3 years. The rules previously allowed for an initial period of up to 12 months leave to be granted, followed by a subsequent period of up to 3 years.

The UK ancestry provision has been changed to allow leave to be granted in a 2 and 3 year pattern, rather than allowing one single period up to the settlement qualifying period. Retired Persons of Independent Means will still be eligible for one single period of leave all the way up to the settlement qualifying period as before.


Work Permit holders will still be eligible for an initial grant of leave up to the currency of their work permit. Highly Skilled Migrant's will now be able to amalgamate continuous time spent in the UK as a work permit holder, Highly Skilled Migrant and / or an Innovator when applying for indefinite leave to remain as a Highly Skilled Migrant. This Statement of Changes in Immigration Rules will be laid before Parliament on 13 March 2006. The Government announced these changes to the Immigration Rules in February 2005 in its paper "Controlling Our Borders: the Five Year Strategy for Asylum and Immigration". These will bring the requirements for settlement nearer to those for citizenship; and to bring the UK's practice for the qualifying period required in line with the rest of the European Union.

This Statement of Changes in Immigration Rules will be incorporated into a <u>consolidated version of the Immigration</u> <u>Rules</u> which can be found under the 'Laws & Policy' page of below mentioned website, where there are also copies of all the Statement of Changes in Immigration Rules issued since May 2003.

#### PRESERVING OUR CULTURAL HERITAGE

March is recognized as National Heroes and Heritage Month in St. Vincent and the Grenadines so at the time of preparing information for this issue of Insight we are right in the middle of the recognition but that period will be over by the time this article is printed. Two of the things that Vincentians are widely known for are, one, we do not like to write and the other is that we find it difficult to recognize those among us who are making contributions well above the accepted norm and therefore show public recognition to them.

By an Act of Parliament in 2002, March 14 was proclaimed as National Heroes Day and ultimately the entire month was declared as Heritage Month. The objectives of the declarations were:

- a. To increase general public knowledge about our history, heroes and heritage;
- b. To heighten public awareness about the importance of National Heroes;
- c. To continue the process of preserving our National Heritage;
- d. To generate stronger feelings of National Pride among Vincentians.

To date, however, we have been only able to identify and agree on one individual as a National Hero. Listening to discussions on the topic some argue that in order to uphold the dignity of the recognition we should not hastily name a bunch of persons but rather take our time so that citizens could take time to appreciate the value of the award. There is the feeling though that we are so critical a community that we find it difficult to show our appreciation to our own for their contributions.

The various SVG associations and organizations outside of St. Vincent and the Grenadines seem however to regularly host events to recognize their outstanding members. This is commendable and it is hoped that the records of the contributions of those individuals are shared so that Vincentians all over world could be able to access them. Quite often, due to the lack of written information on our achievers and stalwarts later generations do not get to know about them. Quoting the words of one of SVG's Cultural Officers, Anthony Theobalds, "One of the constant concerns (one may even say complaint) of students and other researchers, has been the lack of written documents. They have found that usually they are directed to a person who must then be interviewed, therefore making it a longer and more complex process that slows the sharing of our heritage".

Apart from the award of National Hero there are other awards and recognitions that our government bestows on its citizens. There are quite a number of Vincentians in the Diaspora who have distinguished themselves and are making meaningful contributions to not only where they reside but to a great extent to life in St. Vincent and the Grenadines. They too, need to be considered for some of those national recognitions. In order therefore for Vincentians at home to know about these ambassadors of SVG it is important that the information about them be widely circulated.

Joseph Chatoyer is our only declared National Hero and a lot is not well known about him because there is very little written information on him. I print here for you what is found in a document produced by The Ministry of Urban Development, Culture, Labour & Electoral Matters. In future issues of Insight, we would share information on some other outstanding contributors to our nation so that those at least within our readership could share with their younger ones.

The Right Excellent Joseph Chatoyer, Paramount Kalinago leader of the Carib Peoples and Defender of Hairouna was a brilliant military strategist, a world class diplomat and most importantly, he was and still today is loved and respected by his people. On the night of March 14, the English stormed Dorsetshire Hill where Duvallier, the Windward Carib Chief and Chatoyer had just earlier made their headquarters.

Joseph Chatoyer led the Carib people in a guerilla campaign against the invading French and British. Often times, the battles were pitted so they fought against one another to the advantage of Chatoyer and his people.

Chatoyer by that time was convinced that he couldn't be killed by mortal means. He therefore challenged Major Alexander Leith to a duel. Major Leith was a trained army officer therefore he was a good user of the sword and so Chatoyer was killed in that duel. The French version of the duel says that while Chatoyer was getting the upper hand of Major Leith, an English soldier shot the Carib Chief in the back. Whichever way Chatoyer was killed, the limited information available on him dictates that he was a great leader. We know that his home and headquarters were at Morne Ronde on the northwestern end of the island. There is no clue as to his final resting place.

In commemoration of the life and struggles of this the greatest son of our soil, March 14, the day of his death is celebrated as National Heroes Day. The Right Excellent Joseph Chatoyer was awarded the highest honour of achievement attainable from the State on March 14, 2002 and became the first to attain the Order of National Hero of St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

By share coincidence, another of our outstanding nation builders, Ebenezer Theodore Joshua died on that same date, March 14. A summary of Mr. Joshua's life and contributions to St. Vincent and the Grenadines will be shared in an upcoming issue.

## "America's High Tech "Invisible Man"

You may not have heard of Dr. Mark Dean. And you aren't alone. But almost everything in your life has been affected by his work.

See, Dr. Mark Dean is a Ph.D. from Stanford University. He is in the National Hall of Inventors. He has more than 30 patents pending. He is a vice president with IBM. Oh, yeah. And he is also the architect of the modern-day personal computer. Dr. Dean holds three of the original nine patents on the computer that all PCs are based upon. And, Dr. Mark Dean is an African American.

So how is it that we can celebrate the 20th anniversary of the IBM personal computer without reading or hearing a single word about him? Given all of the pressure mass media are under about negative portrayals of African Americans on television and in print, you would think it would be a slam dunk to highlight someone like Dr. Dean.

Somehow, though, we have managed to miss the shot. History is cruel when it comes to telling the stories of African Americans. Dr. Dean isn't the first Black inventor to be overlooked Consider John Stanard, inventor of the refrigerator, George Sampson, creator of the clothes dryer, Alexander Miles and his elevator, Lewis Latimer and the electric lamp. All of these inventors share two things: One, they changed the landscape of our society; and, two, society relegated them to the footnotes of history. Hopefully, Dr. Mark Dean won't go away as quietly as they did. He certainly shouldn't. Dr. Dean helped start a Digital Revolution that created people like Microsoft's Bill Gates and Dell Computer's Michael Dell. Millions of jobs in information technology can be traced back directly to Dr. Dean.

More important, stories like Dr. Mark Dean's should serve as inspiration for African-American children. Already victims of the "Digital Divide" and failing school systems, young, Black kids might embrace technology with more enthusiasm! if they knew someone like Dr. Dean already was leading the way.

Although technically Dr. Dean can't be credited with creating the computer -- that is left to Alan Turing, a pioneering 20th Century English mathematician, widely considered to be the father of modern computer science -- Dr. Dean rightly deserves to take a bow for the machine we use today. The computer really wasn't practical for home or small business use until he came along, leading a team that developed the interior architecture (ISA systems bus) that enables multiple devices, such as modems and printers, to be connected to personal computers.

In other words, because of Dr. Dean, the PC became a part of our daily lives. For most of us, changing the face of society would have been enough. But not for Dr. Dean. Still in his early forties, he has a lot of inventing left in him.

He recently made history again by leading the design team responsible for creating the first 1-gigahertz processor chip.. It's just another huge step in making computers faster and smaller.

As the world congratulates itself for the new Digital Age brought on by the personal computer, we need to guarantee that the African-American story is part of the hoopla surrounding the most stunning technological advance the world has ever seen. We cannot afford to let Dr. Mark Dean become a footnote in history. He is well worth his own history book.

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



