IMMIGRATION MATTERS: VINCENTIAN REFUGEES?



I have received requests to provide some educational information about refugee claims. It appears that there is talk in the Vincentian community concerning the validity of Vincentians making refugee claims. There have been unrelenting declarations made that Vincentians should not and are not acceptable to make such claims. Many people are uninformed about the meaning and implications of the term "refugee" as it relates to Immigrants. The Encarta World English dictionary defines a refugee as "somebody who seeks or takes refuge in a foreign country, especially to avoid war or persecution." This meaning changes to tie in with the context by which it is being referenced in relation to immigrants. Canada offers protection to individuals or families who are fearful of returning to their home country. As such, provisions are made for such person(s) to seek refugee protection under two main classes: through a Resettlement Program or through a Refugee Claim process.

Under the Resettlement Program, persons who are residents of a "source country" may apply directly at the Canadian visa office serving their region. The current list of countries designated as "source countries" are: DR Congo, Sudan, El Salvador, Guatemala, Colombia, and Sierra Leone.

These are the countries that are also generally referred to as "refugee producing countries". Persons from other countries may apply after being referred by a referral organization (such as the UNHCR) or by being sponsored by a private sponsoring group.

Persons in Canada may apply through the Refugee Claim process. This class of persons is generally called refugee claimants. Under this class, a person may apply as a Convention Refugee or a Person in need of protection



referred to in our community as a "refugee".
Here are a few definitions that should help to clarify some misconceptions:

- Convention Refugee: A person who is outside of their country of nationality or habitual residence and who is unable or unwilling to return to that country because of a well-founded fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, political opinion, nationality, or membership in a particular group. Note: membership in a particular group also encompasses women who are victims of domestic abuse, homosexuals, persons with medical or social impairments (including HIV/AIDS), etc.
- Person in need of protection: A person in Canada whose removal to their country of nationality or former habitual residence would subject them to the possibility of

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torture, risk to life, or risk of cruel and unusual treatment or punishment.

• Refugee Claimant: A person deemed eligible to make a claim for refugee or protected status.

With this information in mind let's answer the following questions:

- 1. Is St. Vincent and the Grenadines a refugee producing country? **No!**
- **2.** Could a person from SVG (or any other Caribbean island) apply for and obtain refugee or protected status? **Yes!**
- 3. Have claimants from SVG actually obtained refugee status? **Yes!**

The issues that Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) and the Immigration and Refugee Board (IRB) addresses, surrounds the eligibility criteria and the determination as to whether or not a claim ant meets the defined definitions.

Undocumented immigrants have two other categories besides the refugee class under which they may apply for status. They may apply under Humanitarian and Compassionate grounds or under the Spouse or Common-Law Partner class category.

I am not advocating for or against claims for refugee status. In my capacity as a legal representative, I seek to educate the public so that they may be enlightened about this and other misconstrued immigration processes.

New Look Drivers Licence

The long awaited new national driver's licence system is expected to be on stream soon.

The project which was scheduled to begin since in January was put on hold by the Inland Revenue Department. Drivers will be able to trade-in the outdated booklet licences for the new ones in as short a time as one week when they are introduced. Drivers will be asked to bring in their old licence books, take a new photograph then they would be able to collect a new licence.

The licenses would be available with options of one year, three year or five year expiry dates, and Pompey is encouraging drivers to choose the longer expiry dates which he said would work out to be cheaper in the end.

Grenadines Wharf Service Fee

There is now a \$1 service charge at the terminal building at the Grenadines wharf for persons who use the ferry to travel to the Grenadines and there still seems to be reluctance among some passengers about the new system.

The service charge will assist with the maintenance of the Ferry Terminal and all the other wharfs throughout the country. The terminal also caters for differentlyabled persons with specially designed restrooms.

According to Port Officials, "What we are trying to do is protect the passengers. We are taking them out of the

sun and the rain. They do not have to wonder where to go to use the bathroom. They can have things to eat inside and can sit in the waiting area and watch cricket and can even use the computers."

Those who are exempted from the service charge are senior citizens, school children in uniform, persons travelling on government business and persons who are going on the wharf to drop off things to the boat.

Rabacca Dry River Bridge Opens

With estimates of nearly one-half of the population of SVG in attendance and what many referred to as, "the largest crowd to gather in St Vincent and the Grenadines, the Rabacca Dry River Bridge was officially opened in late March.

Over the past years many folks feared to cross the "dry river bed" for fear that if there was a sudden shower of heavy rains they would be trapped either while crossing or while wanting to get to the other side of the river.


With the style befitting an evangelical preacher, Prime Minister Gonsalves compared the doubters and naysayers who questioned the \$8.5 million project to Sanballat and Tobiah; two biblical agitators that sought to frustrate the Jerusalem temple rebuilding process in the days of the Prophet Nehemiah.

"Since this bridge has been built, Rabacca has become a most popular spot," Minister Daniel said. He further stated that the bridge will be a gateway to the economic development of the area.

Also addressing the massive gathering was Ambassador Jack Cheng of the Republic of China on Taiwan. The Taiwanese contributed \$5.4 million to the project while the remaining three or so million came from the Government of St Vincent and the Grenadines.

The official ceremony was decorated with wonderful cultural performances. The Owia, Sandy Bay and St Mary's RC primary schools and the Chatoyer Youth Movement all performed well. The Uwarani Dance Group of Belize with their Garifuna Invocation and Jamaican gospel Superstar Carlene Davis were well received by the eager crowd.

The ceremony ended with the unveiling of the plaque by Governor General Sir Frederick Ballantyne, and the blessing of the bridge by Archbishop Cosmore Pompey. The cutting of the ribbon was followed by the symbolic first crossing of the bridge by Dr Ralph Gonsalves and other dignitaries along with residents and children from the area.

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



A kilowatt and a kilowatt-hour are the units we use to measure the amount of electricity we consume.

The typical Ontario household consumes approximately 850 kilowatt-hours each month. About 15% of this is for lighting. The typical home has about 25 light bulbs.

Hope for People with Type Two Diabetes

Hope appears on the horizon for millions of Caribbean nationals who suffer from type 2 diabetes. Researchers writing in the journal, Nature, revealed that they have mapped the most important genes which cause people to have type 2 diabetes and discovered that it is caused by a genetic mutation of a particular zinc transporter. Type 2 is caused by deficiency in the production of insulin by the pancreas and the discovery has now led to researchers to believe that it may be possible to treat or cure the disease by fixing the transporter. Researcher Professor Philippe Froguel, from imperial college London, said: "Our new findings mean that we can create a good genetic test to predict people's risk of developing this type of diabetes." The study was carried out by researchers at Imperial College London and McGill University in Montreal, Canada, Diabetes can lead to blindness. amputations, kidney disease and leave sufferers with high risk of developing heart disease. In the Caribbean, Barbados which has a high rate of diabetes is referred to as the "amputation capital of the Caribbean".

Prime Minister Dr. Ralph E. Gonsalves will spend the next two weeks resting in the Republic of Cuba, following his involvement in a vehicular accident on Easter Monday.

Last Friday morning, Dr. Gonsalves, Minister of Health and the Environment –Dr. Douglas Slater; Zaccheus Parris - the PM's driver who was also injured in the accident, and Security Officer, Sergeant Christopher Benjamin, left for the Republic of Cuba aboard a private jet.

Dr. Gonsalves and his driver, Sergeant Parris on Easter Monday narrowly escaped serious injuries from a vehicular accident along Peruvian Vale main road, when the jeep G 7, in which they were travelling, collided with a banana truck.

Both Prime Minister Gonsalves and Parris, sustained injuries and were hospitalised for a short while.

On Friday morning, a limping Dr.Gonsalves departed E.T. Joshua Airport to Cuba in the presence of several of his Cabinet colleagues, wife – Eloise Gonsalves, Cuban Ambassador – Olga Chameno Trias and Taiwanese Ambassador – Jack Yu-Tai Cheng.



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While in Cuba, following his recuperation, Dr. Gonsalves will take the opportunity to conduct some government business with Cuban authorities, pertaining to several projects and assistance, committed to by the Cuban Government.


