

## Vincy Unity Picnic 2004 By Gideon Exeter

Some historians amongst us may disagree with me but although I am unable to remember the exact year it started, this picnic was named the Unity Picnic during the term of former Consul General J. Burns Bonadie. This summer picnic was held back in the days of our first Honorary Consul General, Mr. Ceford Providence but it was not consistently held at 1000 Islands nor did it include the three associations of Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto.

My recollection is that Mr. Bonadie suggested the picnic to be held to coincide with Caricom Day and invited the three associations to participate in it. Regardless to when it started, The Vincy Unity Picnic has grown to such a grand affair that our fellow Caribbean islanders envy us for the attendance, comradeship and altogether good behaviour that Vincentians exhibit year after year.

Many of us look forward to this picnic to meet friends and school mates whom we would not normally meet. Others use the opportunity to just get out and have fun. This year's picnic has had the largest attendance so far and it may well be the expected presence of Prime Minister, Hon. Dr. Ralph Gonsalves that encouraged some folks out. The estimates range from five to six thousand persons and there were Vincentians and friends of Vincentians from other nationalities.

For a change, the eleven buses from Toronto got to

Brown's Bay Provincial Park before noon and on getting there at 11:00 a.m. was a challenge to get picnic tables. Montreal provided 10 buses and Ottawa 2 but we are still unable to determine the number of private vehicles that were spreaded around the park. For some unknown reason the buses from Montreal and Ottawa usually get there before those from Toronto,

Unlike previous years, we could not have wished for better weather conditions. Some of the youngsters were prepared for such conditions that they were able to have a swim in the lake. Disc Jockeys set up their systems at about six different locations so the carnival atmosphere of music and food filled the air. The third Saturday of July will from now on be the date for the Annual St. Vincent and the Grenadines Associations Unity Picnic.





#### **Gov"t Increases National Scholars**

## CANADA BEST-PERFORMING MARKET FOR TOURISM

With visitors from Canada to the Caribbean islands of St. Vincent & The Grenadines up by 15.7 percent this year, Canada has become the best performing market for these Caribbean islands.

Canadian "same day" visitors, day-tripping from nearby islands such as Barbados, St. Lucia and Grenada, are up by 7.2 percent.

And Canadians are staying longer. While the average length of stay for European visitors is 19 days and for Americans 14 days, Canadians tend to stay for 20.3 days, according to figures released by the Ministry of Tourism.

"We are very heartened by these figures," said Rene Baptiste, Minister of Tourism and Culture. "It indicates to us that we are on the right track in developing tourism to our islands. Tourism is on the move here now and with new developments under way and in the planning stage, we are confident that this industry is all set for a very bright future."

Last fall, St. Vincent & The Grenadines launched a campaign in Canada and the United Kingdom designed by the Westminster Communications Group of Toronto, to increase the profile of the islands in the international market. Focus of the campaign is currently on a threemonth promotion in conjunction with the Cadillac Fairview group of shopping malls in Canada. Displays in each of the company's 33 malls across the country are designed to attract consumers to the superb diving, snorkelling, sailing and eco-tourism opportunities available in one of the very few untouched destinations in the Caribbean.

Visitors to the displays can pick up an entry form for a chance to win an all-inclusive vacation for two. The winners will stay at the highly-rated Young Island Resort,

# Hurricane Ivan in St. Vincent

One of the worst hurricanes to go through the Caribbean in the last 30 or so years caused massive devastation in numerous islands as well as in the State of Florida, USA. In the early days of the storm as it travelled its destructive path, Barbados and St. Vincent were viewed as targets for "Ivan the Terrible" but just before its approach to Barbados, it shifted direction southwards with its "eye" virtually missing the two islands.

Whether it was the sweet scent of The Spice Island attracted it away from the Home of the Blessed or something else, we all know that Grenada was not that fortunate as it received the full weight of the worst hurricane to hit it in recorded history. Reports are that over 90 per cent of all buildings were either destroyed or severely damaged. The full report of what happened to Grenada can be found elsewhere. It will take generations for Grenada to return to the pre-Ivan days.

Although the "Home of the Blessed" did not get Ivan's full wrath, St. Vincent and the Grenadines suffered substantial damage which would have seemed greater had our neighbour not been hit so hard. The Windward



side of the country as well as some of the Grenadines islands were hardest hit. Many Vincentians decided to lick their wounds and suggested that despite their damage the international donors should focus more on Grenada than their own country. There were even radiothons to raise money for our cousins south of us and many more functions will be organized to assist them within the next year or so.

Some persons are however expressing concern about the amount of damage the government claims was done to our country but Prime Minister Gonsalves stands by the estimate evaluated by the National Emergency Management Office (NEMO), being just over One hundred million dollars. To help you understand how NEMO and the government arrived at those figures we present a breakdown for our readers on the following page.
