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#### Defining an Independent Country

While the terms country, state, and nation are often used interchangeably, there is a difference.

A State (note the capital "S") is a self-governing political entity. The term State can be used interchangeably with country.

A nation, however, is a tightly-knit group of people which share a common culture. A nation-state is a nation which has the same borders as a State. States and Independent Countries

States and Independent Countries

Let's start with what defines a State or an independent country. An independent State: Has space or territory which has internationally recognized boundaries (boundary disputes are OK).

- Has people who live there on an ongoing basis.
- Has economic activity and an organized economy. A country regulates foreign and domestic trade and issues money.
- Has the power of social engineering, such as education.
- Has a transportation system for moving goods and people.
- Has a government which provides public services and police power.
- Has sovereignty. No other State should have power over the country's territory.
- Has external recognition. A country has been "voted into the club" by other countries.

There are currently <u>195 independent countries or States</u> around the world. Territories of countries or individual parts of a country are not countries in their own right. Examples of entities that are not countries include: Hong Kong, Bermuda, Greenland, Puerto Rico, and most notably the constituent parts of the United Kingdom. (Northern Ireland, Wales, Scotland, and England are not countries.)

A "state" (with a lower-case "s") is usually a division of a federal State (such as the states of the United States of America).

Nations and Nation-States

Nations are culturally homogeneous groups of people, larger than a single tribe or community, which share a common language, institutions, religion, and historical experience.

When a nation of people have a State or country of their own, it is called a nation-state. Places like France, Egypt, Germany, Japan, and New Zealand are excellent examples of nation-states. There are some States which have two nations, such as Canada and Belgium. Even with its multicultural society, the United States is also referred to as a nation-state because of the shared American "culture."

There are nations without States. For example, the Kurds are stateless people.



# **SVG Political Overview**

### **PROFILE:** Background Note: SVG

The People's Political Party (PPP), founded in 1952 by Ebenezer Joshua, was the first major political party in St. Vincent. The PPP had its roots in the labor movement and was in the forefront of national policy prior to independence, winning elections from 1957 through 1966. With the development of a more conservative black middle class, however, the party began to lose support steadily, until it 3

collapsed after a rout in the 1979 elections. The party dissolved itself in 1984.

Founded in 1955, the St. Vincent Labour Party (SVLP), under R. Milton Cato, gained the support of the middle class. With a conservative law-and-order message and a pro-Western foreign policy, the SVLP dominated politics from the mid-1960s until the mid-1980s. Following victories in the 1967 and 1974 elections, the SVLP led the island to independence, winning the first post-independence election in 1979. Expecting an easy victory for the SVLP in 1984, Cato called early elections. The results were surprising: with a record 89% voter turnout, James F. Mitchell's New Democratic Party (NDP) won nine seats in the House of Assembly.

Bolstered by a resurgent economy in the mid-1980s, Mitchell led his party to an unprecedented sweep of all 15 House of Assembly seats in the 1989 elections. The opposition emerged from the election weakened and fragmented but was able to win three seats during the February 1994 elections under a "unity" coalition. In 1998, Prime Minister Mitchell and the NDP were returned to power for an unprecedented fourth term but only with a slim margin of 8 seats to 7 seats for the Unity Labour Party (ULP). The NDP was able to accomplish a return to power while receiving a lesser share of the popular vote, approximately 45% to the ULP's 55%. In March 2001, the ULP, led by Ralph Gonsalves, assumed power after winning 12 of the 15 seats in Parliament.

In the December 2005 parliamentary elections, Prime Minister Gonsalves and the ULP retained their 12-3 majority over the NDP.

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# Articles on SVG's international airport at Argyle

#### And we're off...

Airport works begin in earnest. "This lever is to go forward, this lever is to lift the blade, and this one is to start the airport," Rupert Bullock advised the Prime Minister. And with a shrug, a nod and a characteristic smile, to indicate that he had understood the instructions from Bullock, the

Equipment Supervisor of the International Airport Development Company, the Prime Minister, Hon. Dr. Ralph Gonslaves proceeded to manoeuvre the bulldozer.

In so doing, the Prime Minister signaled the formal commencement of the construction of the Argyle International Airport on Wednesday 13th August, birthday of former Cuban President Fidel Castro and former National Security Minister Vincent I Beache. A large crowd had gathered at Rawacou to witness the ceremonial act by Dr. Gonsalves, the beginning of the undertaking of the single largest project in SVG, a project estimated to cost EC\$589m and originally scheduled for completion by end 2011.

The Prime Minister's careful removal of dirt represented the start of work on the first kilometer of the runway, which is from Stubbs Bay to Colonel Anderson's residence at the entrance to Argyle. This involves the demolition of the Mc Connie Yammie Hill, the leveling of the Stubbs Bay cliff and Johnson Hill, and the filling in of the Mt Pleasant Valley. Up to eight earth- moving machines were in operation last week Wednesday demolishing buildings and uprooting trees and vegetation from the proposed runway location.

Some of the spectators commented on how easy it looked, as within minutes an entire section that was overgrown with mango trees and tall cedars, was cleared. The machines were operated by Cuban and Vincentian heavy equipment operators. There seemed to have been mixed feelings of relief and joy among the gathering, as though to dispel any latent fears they might have had. They left feeling assured that the international airport was now a matter of years away.

Gwendolyn Jack was born in Grenada on September 11, 1908, to Vincentian parents. She came to St Vincent at the tender age of two, the only girl of five children born to her parents.

Throughout her life, this humble woman has been involved in a number of charitable organizations in her church and the community. She was part of the first ever Brownie troop in Calliaqua and the Women's League. She was also part of the music council, having sung since age ten.

The wife of the late George Hubert Jack, Gwendolyn has travelled extensively throughout Canada and has also been to England, the USA and France. "I can tell you about Louis XIV's castle in Versailles" she said.

Gwendolyn is the mother of five children: F.I Jack, former Deputy Headmaster of the St. Vincent Grammar School, who lives here in St. Vincent, as well as Earl Jack, Louise Jack Richards, Joan Jack Heselton and Yvonne Jack, all of whom journeyed from Canada to celebrate their mother's 100th birthday.

Still very active, "Nennie Gwen" as she is called, enjoys a full life. Believe it or not, she still continues to play the piano quite skillfully, does handcraft and sews.

When Searchlight visited her home last Thursday, September 11, she was playing melodious piano music for an appreciative audience. She, however, confided that she "can do very little now" because of her failing sight.

Governor General Sir Frederick Ballantyne was also on hand to wish her a happy birthday and present her with a cake and a bouquet of flowers.

Gwendolyn, who has been worshipping at the St. Paul's Anglican Church in Calliaqua since 1914, said it "feels great" to be one hundred years old. She said her secret to longevity is "trust in God all the time; faith, patience and prayer".

She urges young people to "hold on to God's unchanging words; serve the Lord with gladness; try to put some of the things of the world behind, (as) they would go dim no matter how they look; God First". (VM)

Sidney Cozier, a nine-year old competitive golfer, has won EIGHT tournaments in 2008. Cozier competes in local, national, and now; international tournaments from San Diego, CA to Pinehurst, NC. This "Little Pro", the grandson of Cosmus E. Cozier, Consul General of St Vincent and the Grenadines-New York, has won the "Player of the Year" Award & "Exemption" to US Kids World Championship in Pinehurst, NC next Summer. He Competed in six of the eight tours in Los Angeles and Chino Hills to qualify. He won four of six and earned 154 points. He competed against top kids in the world.

Born in Encinitas, CA, Cozier started competing at the age of four. He won his first trophy at four and a half at Welk Golf Resort in Escondido, CA. He competed in 27 tournaments in 2007. This outstanding junior golfer's best score was 3 under for 33 on the front nine at a Boulder City Golf Course, locaated in a picturesque suburb of Las Vegas, NV.

# Immigration Matters

*Visiting Canada* Contributed: Sandra Sutherland, CCIC

With the onset of the Christmas season many Vincentians may be looking to spend time with their families in Canada. Because there are no temporary resident visa requirements for citizens of St. Vincent and the Grenadines, many visitors take it for granted that they can come and go with ease. This is not always the case. An exemption from the visa requirement merely permits a foreign national to come to Canada to seek entry. It is entirely up to the immigration officer at the port of entry to decide whether or not to grant entry and to define the length of the visit.

Many Vincentians are thoroughly questioned by immigration officials upon their arrival. The outcome of this examination process may lead to authorized entry, further examination procedures, effecting your return home on the next available flight or to your detention. Detention may lead to your removal or release.

The following are tips that could facilitate entry into Canada:

- 1. Conduct yourself well during the examination process: Be sure to understand each question prior to answering. Be confident and respectful and speak clearly.
- 2. Have sufficient information: Know the full name and contact information of who is receiving you and whom you will be staying with. Sometimes you may have to clarify the nature of your relationship between yourself and your host - if so, it is important to ensure consistency with what your host may state if interviewed.
- 3. Have relevant documents: You should have a return ticket that corresponds to the date you claim to return. It's good to have an invitation letter from your host.
- 4. Have sufficient funds that are relative to the nature and duration of your visit.

If you are detained, you should make contact with your host and/or counsel as immediately as possible. Try not to be too easily persuaded by immigration officials. This is not to say that they are not to be trusted but you do need to be vigilant about the nature of your situation and circumstances as well as fully knowing your options.

Bequia - means island of clouds in Arawak but don't let the name deceive you: Bequia's lush hills are much lower than the peaks of St. Vincent, 10 miles to the north, so they don't catch as many showers.

**Canouan** - Carib for "island of turtles", was until a few years ago one of the less developed islands of the Grenadines. Until the late 18th century the island was inhabited by various Indian tribes until the British finally succeeded in defeating the last of these, the Caribs.

Mustique - is an exclusive 1,400-acre island (1.5 miles wide by 3 miles long), 18 miles south of St. Vincent with lush rolling terrain cooled by gentle trade winds, surrounded by pristine white beaches and crystal clear aquamarine waters. The island has a year-round population of about 500 living in the villages of Lovell, Britannia Bay and Dover.

**Mayreau** - Situated 7 miles south of Canouan, Mayreau has a population of only around 200 in the one village on the highest hill of the island. From the church on top of "Station Hill" you have the most spectacular view of the Grenadines.

Petit St. Vincent - (Better known locally as PSV) lies 40 miles south of St. Vincent in the Grenadines. Is a paradise of softly rolling hills spread over 113 acres surrounded by two miles of white sand beaches

The Tobago Cays - are a cluster of four uninhabited islands, protected by the world famous "horseshoe reef". Tobago Cays are a national marine park of St. Vincent and the Grenadines. Only accessible by yacht, they offer superb snorkeling and perfect beaches.

Union Island - is the Southernmost of the Grenadines. Due to its dramatic silhouette, Union is also called by some the Tahiti of the West Indies. Its location just a few miles from the Tobago Cays, Mayreau and Petit St. Vincent has made it the ideal starting point for day charters to these islands.
